These entries were picked from 1,935 artworks submitted by pupils in Years 5 and 6 and chosen by a group of Young Curators currently in Years 12 and 13.

Our mission is to bring together art, environment and young people. We're driven by three core principles:

- 1. Young people are artists in their own right.
- 2. Young people are the art history of tomorrow.
- 3. Art develops environmental understanding.

BUT FIRST, WHAT IS THE YOUNG LONDON PRINT PRIZE?

YLPP is a printmaking competition for young people. All the work is created and judged by young people. The programme is delivered in four parts:

- * Train: we start by training teachers, enhancing their skills, checking that we understand their needs. We provide a resource pack full of practical ideas about making climate art.
- * Deliver: then we run free in-school workshops, guiding and inspiring pupils to make great prints.
- * Convene: next we bring together a panel of Young Judges who learn about careers in the art world and judge all the submissions.
- * Celebrate: finally, we announce and exhibit the prize winners on an international stage alongside some of the world's best printmakers, sharing their art with galleries and the public.

Why are we doing this?

YOUNG PEOPLE ARE ARTISTS IN THEIR OWN RIGHT.

Throughout art history, 'greatness' has been largely preserved for a lucky elite – the masters of the Renaissance or the greats of Modernism. At YLPP, we believe that young people also have the capacity for greatness. They are not 'on their way' to becoming artists, they're already artists in their own right.

We aim to develop confidence, creativity, self-motivation and creative expression in young people by introducing them to the notion of an independent artistic practice: the long-term personal production of art set within a wider cultural understanding of process, experimentation and influence.

YOUNG PEOPLE ARE THE ART HISTORY OF TOMORROW.

We think art history needs to be re-written from the grassroots. As it stands, the mainstream story of art and the contemporary art world do not remotely reflect the breadth of race, class, gender and educational needs that you find in young Londoners.

Over the past decade, there has been a palpable shift in the art world to address this imbalance. Art institutions have been a leading force in this re-writing of history. Organisations such as the Hayward Gallery on the Southbank in London have developed ambitious exhibitions like 'Dear Earth', and radical shifts in curatorial perspectives to include a far greater breadth of voices. Our programme actions this principal from the ground up, supporting the artists of tomorrow.

ART DEVELOPS ENVIRONMENTAL UNDERSTANDING.

Working with young people, there is one thing we cannot ignore the environmental crisis. They will be affected by decision-making today and, soon enough, they will make the decisions of tomorrow. Engaging in arts education focused on the environment is a powerful way to inspire climate action. Through art, we listen to their ideas of young people and empower them to reflect, choose and lead.


